The participants of the training event gathered in the Ministry of Education and Research and first Riin Saadjärv, Head of Education Technology Area in Estonian Ministry of Education and Research, gave an overview how AI is planned to be used in Estonian education. She told about the start of the AI-Leap education programme that is meant to help students to use AI in a wiser way. After that Triin Hüva, the chief expert in the field of external evaluation, gave a short welcoming presentation about Tartu.

The day started with registration at the venue, the Ministry of Education and Research. Elen Ruus, the Head of the Area of External Evaluation, welcomed the guests and told them together with Erik De Bou and Dominique Quéré how the whole event is going to look like. Elen Ruus made a presentation about the Education System in Estonia and supporting inclusion through inspection. After coffee break Rena Selliov, the analyst in the area of External Evaluation, talked about the piloting of STESSIE survey in 4 schools of Tartu from the general point of view. Then Sirkku Kupiainen (Special Adviser, Visiting Researcher; Centre for Educational Assessment CEA; University of Helsinki, Finland) gave a presentation about Finnish comprehensive education system at the crossroads of social inclusion and increasing segregation – to which extent it supports the inclusion and where it actually induces segregation. After lunch Anne Lium Berger (Section Head, Section for Children and Family, Tromso Municipality, Norway) talked about the Omni model - a mindset and tools that helps to create safe and good growing up environments. By the end of the day Erik De Bou spoke about the state of the project. In the evening the guests were invited to join a Tartu City Tour.

04.06.2025

The group was driven to the Kivilinna School where the headmaster of the school gave a thorough overview of the school, teaching practices, inclusion at school etc. She also gave a thorough overview of the STESSIE piloting at school and this feedback was extremely helpful for further development of the STESSIE application. She also showed the group around the school where people were shown one of the first robotics classrooms in Estonia. Then the group walked to Annelinna Gymnasium. After the lunch the headmaster gave an overview of the school and the group was led for a walk around the school. Then the group dealt with translating the website materials. After driving back to the center of Tartu and having a short break for rest, the evening featured an official dinner hosted by the Ministry at Café Werner.

05.06.2025

Participants visited Tamme School and Catholic School, where the headmasters of both schools gave an overview of the school life and then gave a deeper overview of the STESSIE piloting at school. Both schools gave at least partly similar feedback as the Kivilinna School. After the discussion of STESSIE application, the general issues in Estonia and Estonian school system were dealt with. In Tamme School there was also a walk around the school, in Catholic School the Tartu Catholic Church was shown to the group as the church also belongs to the campus of the school. Lunch followed at Café Truffe in Tartu's historic town square.

In the afternoon the group returned to the Ministry. First Berit Asuküla and Triin Hüva gave an overview of inspection in Estonia that was followed by questions and discussion about it. After that the school visits and insights from the visits were discussed.

Erik De Bou reminded everybody about the tasks that still need to be done by all project partners:

- Translation of webpage materials.
- Checking the application language.
- There still will be the user manual and "How to read and analyse". These materials need to be translated.
- Manual for improving wariness for policy makers.
- Privacy and cookie policy needs to be translated, too (2 pages).

In the evening participants gathered for an optional dinner in Kolm Tilli

06.06.2025

The day started with multiplier event in the Estonian Ministry of Education and Research with also a Teams broadcast. Erik De Bou gave an overview of the state of the project, then Dominique Quéré showed in which state is the application.

Helen Arus (Head of General Education in Estonian Quality Agency for Education) gave an overview of Estonian national satisfaction survey and how it can be used for internal evaluation at schools. Merike Reiljan (chief expert in Analysis Department in the Ministry of Education and Research) showed the participants of the multiplier event how the results of national satisfaction survey are visualised in the education statistics portal Haridussilm (Education Eye).

Final presentation of the multiplier event was given by Triin Olderkop, the Program Manager from Educational Counselling Services/ Rajaleidja (Pathfinder) Network about inclusive education in Estonia and the role of Rajaleidja in the students' support system.

Although there were more participants from outside in Teams than at the venue, there were a few most crucial people from outside present in the event – both Helen Arus and Merike Reiljan are the people who deal directly with development and improvement of schools' internal evaluation in Estonia

Conclusion



The evaluation of the event showed that the participants of the training event find that the objectives of the training event were achieved.













Most part of the participants rated different aspects of the training event with the highest value.
















